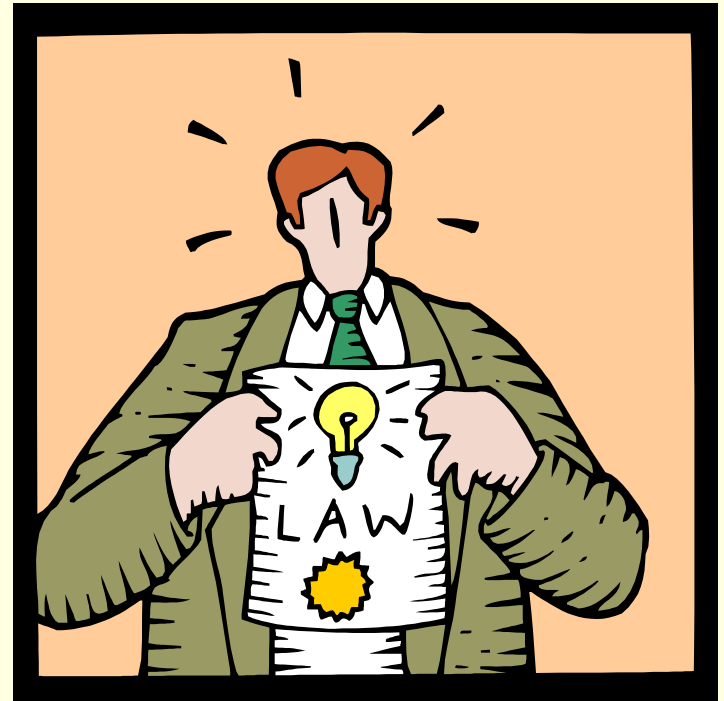

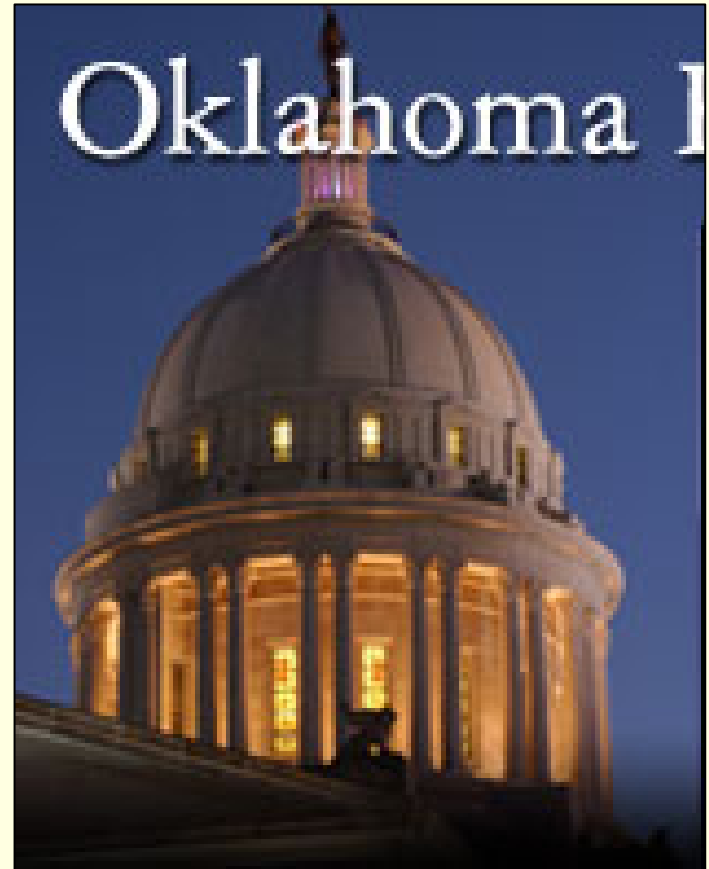
If possible, visit their office at the Capitol

- Call your representative
- Introduce yourself and invite out for coffee
- Be polite and calm
- Explain your interests
- Keep in touch via phone and email
- Get to know the legislative assistant
- Send thank you



Lobbying – Be prompt, friendly

- Meet in their office
- Make appointment or drop in - inquire
- Go in groups of 2 or 3
- Identify yourself and your organization
- Explain briefly why you're there
- Have a handout for research, 1-2 pages



Know when to Lobby

- Interim studies/research
- Introduction of bill
- First Reading – perfunctory/public can read
- Second Reading – also brief; bill assigned to committee
- Committee Assignments – amendments
- Floor consideration and Third Reading
- Calendar/General Order
- Engrossment/Enrolling (scrivener's errors removed)
- To Senate – similar process
- If amended – back to House
- **If passed – to Governor**

Make your letters count...

- Have a Specific Message – i.e. REAL ID, Fusion Centers, “*direct electronic access*”
- Be Brief
- Target Your Letters – i.e. Legislative Assistance or Directors
- Write Letters to the Editor
- Personalize Your Letters – use your own words
- E-Mail Has Limitations – include your name, home address and phone #
- Be Timely, Be Courteous, & Follow Up.

- Make an appointment to meet personally
- Inform yourself and others – (Sunday school, work, etc. Recruit them to lobby)
- Keep in touch – read the information and alerts
- Consider joining conservative groups; donate to them
- Attend Monthly Townhall Meetings
- Get involved in your precincts, county and state party

Federal Legislation

Members of Congress introduce some ten thousand bills in each two-year session of Congress, only a small fraction of which are seriously considered and fewer still enacted as law. GovTrack fetches the status of federal legislation from the official websites using an automatic process on a daily basis. The information here is usually a day or so behind.
